TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT YOUPSELF!

The name my parents gave me is Charlotte but I once met someone called Lotus and I was like 'omg that's so cool', and she was also very sweet and cool and that's why my artist name is Lotus. I'm 20 years old and I have been DJing for 1 year now. For breakfast, I eat vanilla yogurt with hagelslag in it almost every day.

what do you want to get out of this residency?

I want to get a nice experience and fun collaboration out of this residency. This collaboration is so much fun already and it's probably going to be at the top of my list of bests DJ experiences for a long time. Because it's quite rare to work with so many women in the music scene. I love meeting other female DJ's and working with an all-woman crew and I'm honored to be a part of that.

HOW does POTTErdam and its night Life influence what you're doing?

Rotterdam is a city where the people that go out at night come to see you because they like your music, or they first check who is DJing before they buy a ticket. Which makes it easier to play music I really like, because the people that go to see me almost always know what to expect. However, if I play something that is unexpected, Rotterdam people are also open about that and like to hear something they haven't heard before. Whereas in other cities where I've had gigs, people tend to go more towards stuff they know such as hits or sing-alongs. When I go out myself, I noticed that the disco scene here is not so big and at one point I got really bored with the music in the clubs. Because before I would enter the club I already knew what music was playing there and how the night was going to go. That's why I found it so important to bring joy, fun, and groove back on the dancefloor.





where do you see yourself in 5 years?

I don't have the ambition to be a millionaire and live in a villa. I hope that I can earn enough money to pay my rent (apartment in Rotterdam together with my partner), but also go out for dinner sometimes. In five years I have had some exhibitions, played a few festivals, seen more of the world, graduated, a steady job as an artist and DJ gigs on the weekend.

what skills do you believe are necessary to become a dj?

To be honest I think everyone can do it and that DJing is quite accessible. But what I think is essential is a good selection of music. If your selection of songs sucks, then it doesn't matter if you can mix super well. Besides that, a skill that will make your life easier is being absolutely in love with your own music. Being able to just play what you want without caring what is mainstream or something that everyone likes is a skill you will need to get the most fun out of DJing.

Zena-Rae :) She made me fall in love with DJing before I even knew what exactly DJing meant. I never saw myself as someone that would be a DJ but when I saw Zena do it, it completely changed the stereotypical image of DJs I had in my mind. I've had moments before big gigs where I wanted to call in sick so bad and ask someone else if they could do it, just because I was nervous. And luckily I have the right people around me who always try to comfort me as much as possible. I'm most proud of all the gigs I still did. I never canceled a gig because of how nervous I was. Especially the big gigs that turned out to be so much fun I'm really proud of. It feels like I conquer my fears every time.

This Time Baby - Jackie Moore, I think there will be a moment I start playing this song again but also because I listened and played it so much the magic is kinda gone. But there is definitely a lot of soul and magic in this song and if I would hear someone else play it in the club or at a festival I would dance very hard.





wнат's in your rider?


Nothing special, some Cola's and beers.
